Brandywine Red Clay Alliance (BRC) is proud to announce they are one of approximately 470 accredited land trusts in the country as determined by the Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance.



There are nearly 1,400 land trusts in total, which makes us part of a small portion (34%) that have went through the rigorous review process to prove that we meet national standards for ethical and sound practices in our land conservation work.

The goal of the accreditation process is to strengthen land trusts, ensure the land conservation projects will withstand the test of time, and that easement terms will be supported in perpetuity by BRC or any future easement holder.

BRC's accreditation process was longer than most as it normally takes approximately one year for an organization to go through the phased application steps. With the 2022 merger, the Commission actually had two applications to review as The Land Conservancy for Southern Chester County submitted their second renewal of accreditation application in late 2021. This application was then held and combined with BRC's spring 2022 application for first-time accreditation. Thankfully, after many months of review and multiple document submissions, the Commission agreed that our land conservation work continues to meet their standards and we can now work under the accreditation seal as evidence to the public of our commitment to ethical and sound practices.

Young Waterfowlers Program

Waterfowling is an American tradition that combines hunting with an appreciation of wetlands and their wildlife.

In order to instill a strong conservation ethic for all of our natural resources, Brandywine Red Clay Alliance (BRC) is providing an exciting opportunity for youngsters ages 11 through 16. Participants will study wildlife management, habitat protection, conservation practices and the values of wetlands during a comprehensive introduction to the american waterfowling heritage. Special topics include identification of waterfowl, conservation ethics, retriever training, decoy carving, safety skills and good sportsmanship. An optional hunt will be offered at the conclusion of the program, under the supervision of experienced guides. This is an exciting hands on all outdoors program. Lunch will be provided.

Parent participation is encouraged, but not required (no extra fee). Participants will have the opportunity to fulfill the hunter safety requirements at no additional charge and will receive a certification card (required for all new hunters in PA and DE).

Led by Jim Jordan, BRC Executive Director, CEO with instruction provided by a host of regional experts; including accomplished carvers, dog trainer and world champion waterfowl callers.

Advanced Young Waterfowlers – ages 13-18. For alumnae of previous Young Waterfowler programs, we offer additional training in the art and science of waterfowling; including advanced decoy carving and calling techniques. Students will have an opportunity to participate in a specially guided hunt on a private farm.

Educational Programming

Welcome back to all those formal educators out there!

We are hard at work updating our lesson plans with the new PA state standards. Our fall teaching calendar (Pennsylvania and Delaware) is almost full and we've started to book dates for spring of 2025. During the 2024 school year we had a 25% increase in the number of students we saw over the 2023 school year... which is inching us closer to our pre-Covid rates. In addition, we awarded \$15,000 in scholarships to local school districts... making environmental field trips more accessible. During 2024 we also added enrichment programs open to the public.







Victory Garden

Once again, BRC planted our Victory garden with the help of volunteers from WSFS Bank.

By the end of summer we had donated 1,400 pounds of fresh produce to the Kennett Food Cupboard from our Victory Garden. Summer campers enjoyed helping with the harvest of zucchini, tomatoes, and peppers.



Campers also enjoyed picking our high bush blueberries for a healthy morning snack!

Tree Plantings for Clean Water

BRC continues to support tree planting projects in the watershed as well as helping provide trees to landowners.

In May, BRC planted 153 trees and 25 shrubs on a farm on the East Branch Red Clay Creek in East Marlborough Township with 25 volunteers from Comcast. We also continue to partner with the Chester County Conservation District and the Keystone 10 Million Tree Project distributing 2,500 trees to Chester County residents.

Learning by Doing

In July, BRC hosted City of Wilmington Green Jobs High School Interns for two days on the Brandywine. On day one we went seining with Dr. Ed Hale of DE Sea Grant and caught juvenile shad and eels. Students were also thrilled to learn to fish and even catch a few smallmouth bass and bluegills. On day two, we went canoeing out of Northbrook and cooled off with a swim in the refreshing waters of Brandywine Creek.







Fall Land Stewardship Activities

In addition to securing ecologically valuable land threatened by development, BRC engages in a variety of traditional and innovative land stewardship efforts across our fee lands.

Stewardship is an essential component of conservation that stresses the interdependent relationship people have with their natural environment and serves as a commitment to restore and maintain land that provides native plant and wildlife habitat, scenic hiking trails, and outdoor educational spaces.

We invite you to give back to the land you love by employing good stewardship practices on your own property.

A few of our top suggestions for sustainably managing your yard this season are:

- Compost leaves that have fallen in your yard or leave them lie over the winter in flower beds and part of the yard to provide habitat for insects and the birds and mammals that eat them
- Consider installing bird feeders for migrating and wintering birds
- Cut and remove previously hard to access vines from trees (more information following)
- Cage younger native trees you find popping up to prevent deer rub

Fall treatment also allows landowners better access as you can wait for the underbrush to die back if you have larger woodlands or extensive areas of invasives. For vines, our stewardship team recommends cutting a chunk out of the vine to prevent the ends from sprouting and reconnecting. The vine will die, rot, and fall out of the tree so you do not need to do anything to pull it down. These invasive vines such as Oriental Bittersweet and Porcelain Berry can grow as big as trees themselves and they form dense mats over our forests and block the sun for our native trees.

Managing vines on your property will help ensure your native trees are not weakened and killed by the vines over time. This stewardship practice requires rather little time depending on your property size, but can have a huge impact on the health of your woodland. If you do have a larger woodland to manage, get in the habit of carrying clippers on your walks and cut a few vines a day during the fall and winter. Every vine cut is a tree protected.



Brandywine Clean-up

This year's clean up in the Brandywine Creek watershed covered 32 miles of roads and 17 miles of streams at four clean up locations in 11 municipalities across two states (PA and DE).

Over 180 volunteers filled three dumpsters with trash and collected 42 tires from the watershed from Modena, Pennsylvania to Brandywine Valley Unit of the First State National Historical Park in Delaware.



Red Clay Clean-up

In March, BRC continued our annual clean up of the Red Clay Creek watershed in Pennsylvania and Delaware with 448 volunteers collecting 6.8 tons of trash and 146 tires.

Since our first clean-up, 18,969 volunteers have removed 439 tons of trash from the watershed!
